In other news, the newly appointed Granada Hills/Knollwood Design Review Board met on March 11, 2008. On the agenda was the proposed Kohls project for Granada Shopping Village. A number of residents attended, as this was an open meeting. Everyone who wished to speak was afforded an opportunity. There were a number of questions regarding landscaping, lighting, and architectural detail that were unresolved. As a result, the Design Review Board disapproved the project as currently proposed. No doubt Kohls and Regency Centers will come back with a revised proposal. But in the meantime, it appears the Kohls project is on hold.

On March 5, 2008, a number of Granada Hills residents attended a scooping meeting sponsored by the City Planning Department. The purpose of the meeting was to receive input from the public regarding the Environmental Impact Report that will be prepared as part of the review process. A private company will prepare the report itself. Once prepared, there will be a public meeting to review the draft proposal and offer comment. Once a final draft is prepared, it must be submitted to several agencies for approval.

Finally, it is time once again for nominations and election to our Board of Directors. We have a seven-member board, who designate the officers for the organization. I urge anyone who is interested in serving on the board to place their name in nomination. *Dave Beauvais*

Tamara's Column - Dott Stage

If you think welding and woodshop is just for mechanics and builders, think again.

Dott Stage, 82, an art teacher, has been welding, sculpting and woodcarving since the 1960's.

"I took a sculpture class at Pierce and the teacher said it was too easy for me," says Dott of her first experience.

From there, Dott earned an Associate's degree of Art from Pierce College and a Bachelor's degree in teaching from Cal State Northridge.

Throughout the years, Dott has taught welding, sculpture and woodcarving classes everywhere from Pierce and Cal State Northridge to community centers and senior centers. She also teaches from her home where she has a welding and woodcarving studio.

"My favorite is teaching oxy-acetylene welding," she says. "You come to class with leather gloves, closed-toed shoes, a long handled pair of pliers and a face shield." Dott then teaches her students how to use a cutting torch on a tin can, from which they are to make a piece of art.

As for Dott's own artwork, she likes to create either abstract or realistic sculptures.

"I do it on my free time when I'm not cleaning, I hate cleaning," she says.

Her professional title, "DEYAR," is a name an artist gives to themselves, also known as a "Nom de Plume" or "art of the pen."

Dott's artwork has been displayed at art shows and art galleries, the Ventura County Fair, the Golden Nugget Casino, the Tony Roma restaurant at Universal City Walk, the CSUN art gallery, events for the Golden State Sculpture Association, and much more. She has even taught welding on two television shows.

Some of her artwork includes a nine-foot metal giraffe, a six-foot bird, a doe head in wood, a mermaid, a metal praying-mantis, gun fighting cowboys, and a phoenix rising from the ashes. Her work is created on materials such as metal, wood, marble and clay. Her favorite piece of work is a metal horse she created (pictured).

"I enjoy doing mostly animals," she says.

Dott's home is filled with artwork created by her and her husband. She also has many pets.

"I have 13 hens, one rooster, four cats, and one dog that was given to me because it needed a home," she says.

Besides creating artwork, Dott enjoys tending to her vegetable garden, making marmalade, cooking, reading novels, quilting, sewing and making jewelry.

She also teaches swimming lessons to people of all ages, "from 90 years-old to 10-months-old," either at her own home or the student's home, Dott says.

In the future, Dott plans to continue teaching because it is what she loves to do.

Dott has lived in Granada Hills for over 50 years and has

three children, nine grandchildren, and one great grandson.

"I like Granada Hills because it is quiet, peaceful and relaxing," she says.

Street Sealing

You might have noticed or have been slightly inconvenienced by the streets in our area that are undergoing slurry sealing. This type of surface treatment prolongs the life of the pavement by stopping asphalt erosion created by water and oxidation from the sun. The Bureau of Street Services, which is part of the Department of Public Works is responsible for streets, sidewalks, and our public trees - the urban forest. Their website, www.lacity.org/BOSS has a lot of information and some great presentations.



The bureau is allocated funding for the 6500 miles of streets in the City of Los Angeles. It gets parcelled out to each Council District where the Councilmember chooses the streets in their district where the repair work will be done. Thank you Greig! Las Lomas Development Blocked

Councilman Smith's motion to have the City make a policy decision to stop the Las Lomas development, stop the annexation of the land into City of Los Angeles and reject the Supplemental Fee Agreement to allow the developer to expedite the project, was approved by the City Council Wednesday, March 19.

The Las Lomas project was too big, too dense, and couldn't be planned in a worse place. It would have a devastating effect on traffic, the environment and would unacceptably strain our water, infrastructure and public safety resources. The huge coalition of opponents to Las Lomas who came together to say no to this project have our gratitude and praise for stepping up to the plate to defend our community.

Residents, community groups, elected officials, Neighborhood Councils and environmental groups took official positions of opposition to Las Lomas, wrote letters of opposition, and made public comments against the development at Neighborhood Council meetings, City Council meetings and Planning & Land Use Management Committee meetings.

March 19th was a big victory for the San Fernando Valley in the fight to protect our quality of life and ensure that we focus on the needs of our communities. *from the Councilman's email briefing*

Featured Home: Tom & Donna McArdle



The home was built in 1961 for Mr./Mrs. Earl Zook. Original house was @ 2,720 sq foot on approx. 1/3 acre. It had 2 bedrooms, 1.5 baths, living room/dining room combo, kitchen, breakfast room, with peg-and-grove hardwood floors throughout, raised foundation, brick porch (front and back).

In 1977, the second next owners--Mr./Mrs Mike McGlone--enclosed the existing breezeway, converted the 2-car garage into 2 bedrooms and added a 4-car garage. Tom knew Mike (they both enjoyed restoring old cars) and would describe the interior of the house to me, knowing how much I liked wood floors. Whenever I would stop at the intersection, I'd try to imagine what it was like inside. Little did I know-----

We purchased the house in 1983 and remodeled some of the inside and backyard—nothing that shows from the front—until 2007 when we had the house painted and replaced the windows. When it came time to give the driveway and front yard a facelift, we found Jim Keltner of Western Horizons through the recommendation of Lahey St. neighbor Don Rogers.

Front Yard Features:



What impressed us most about Jim was his unpretentious demeanor and his ability to take the ideas we had and visualize a design that unified the large corner lot with the house. He even considered how the design would look from inside the living room's bay window, and was patient when we needed explanations, time to absorb his design, and a few revisions.

A good example of his attention to detail is seen in the ribbons of brick that accent the stamped concrete, matching the brick on the corner sitting wall; both use the same aged Simon brick that is found on the front porch and incorporate precision cut pieces of brick. Another example are the pillars that frame the driveway entrances; they are custom designed for our yard and won't be repeated in any of his future work.

The White Oak yard was turned into a small orchard with the addition of 4 fruit trees while saving the 2 original orange trees, providing both function and variety to the yard.

Jim works with Chad Curtis of LandscapePros to oversee the irrigation and softscape installation and electrician Ralph Persinger of Top Quality Electric. Like Jim, Chad and Ralph were very accessible when we had questions and took time to understand our wishes. Every crew was respectful of our property and worked neatly.

Without hesitation, we recommend all the contractors. Most importantly, we are enjoying the change every day.

Granada Hills-Knollwood Community Plan

Los Angeles Department of City Planning has been scheduling Community Plan update meetings on a regular basis since October 2006. The most recent meeting was held at Granada Hills Charter High School, March 5th. Anna Vidal, City Planning Associate along with other City Planning officials presented information regarding the Planning Department's intention to prepare an Environmental Impact Report. The Community Plan will change zones, amend plan designations & districts and establish overlay zones, as needed. Therefore these changes need to be evaluated as to their impact on the environment. The following issues will be analyzed in detail in the EIR: Aesthetics, Soil & Geology, Public Services, agricultural Resources, Recreation, Air & Water Quality, Land Use & Planning, Population & Housing, Biological Resources, Noise, Transportation & Traffic, Cultural Resources, Population, Utilities & Service Systems

If you missed this last meeting, not to worry, you will have more opportunities in the near future. City Officials along with neighborhood organizations will notify community stakeholders regarding future meeting dates and locations. Your input is vital. Our community needs to be part of this very important process that will plan for future density and development through the year 2030.

Graffiti Update

You've all probably noticed the rash of graffiti outbreaks we've had all over the OGH area for the past several months.

I'm sure it evokes the same response in all of us. Anger, outrage and frustration. Laura Kelly, Kent Yeager and Mike Dobry, among others have noticed too and have been working on doing something about it.

They've been working with LAPD Senior Lead Officers (SLO's) Dario Del Core, Ken Cioffi and the Volunteer Surveillance Team (VST) as well as property owners, and billboard companies. The goal of course is to catch the vandals in the act, but also to document the tagging and have it removed as quickly as possible. Graffiti, especially if not removed immediately gives the appearance of "we don't care" which of course can be nothing further from the truth about our OGH.

We are told that the vandalism is mostly done by kids, not gang members, however, some is gang related. Apparently, the billboards along Chatsworth in the business district that get 'hit' are done by tagging teams. These teams are made up of kids/hoodlums, who probably live in the area or nearby.

The VST was hoping to catch offenders on a recent Friday night, when a surveillance team was assigned to watch the billboards along Chatsworth... Unfortunately, they did not catch anyone in the act.

This is a big problem and as such is being treated with urgency and a great deal of attention by Devonshire Division. An officer was recently appointed to the newly created position of *Community Tagger Task Force*. This officer will be handling *only* the graffiti and vandalism problem. He has experience in the Gang Unit and will be a great asset in addressing the graffiti problem; however he has a very wide area of concern and is counting on community volunteers and the SLO officers for help. Five volunteers in our area including Laura Kelly, Richard Fisk, Caroline West and Kent Yeager have been assigned portions of OGH and are charged with photographing and communication with SLO, Del Core as graffiti is spotted. Other volunteers are working with the

other SLO's at Devonshire Division. In this way, the police are able to build stronger cases against offenders and when they are caught, charge them with all of the tagging they've done, which becomes a felony after \$400 worth of damages.

Gratefully, we haven't had any major outbreaks recently. I don't know when we can all let out our collective breath - many never. But we can keep fighting! *Laura Kelly*

Citrus Sunday - April 6th

For the third year, OGHRG is teaming with Councilman Greig Smith and the Valley Interfaith Council to sponsor Citrus Sunday.



There are about 130,000 San Fernando Valley residents who are "food insecure", meaning that they do not have enough to eat at some point any given month. These folks may be homeless, disabled, elderly, or otherwise unable to make ends meet. To meet these residents' nutritional needs, a number of faith-based organizations provide food through food pantries across the valley.

However, these food pantries are not able to provide much in the way of fresh fruit and vegetables. Citrus Sunday is an event intended to supplement the usual food pantry staples with fresh citrus fruit. The residents of Old Granada Hills are fortunate to have many citrus trees on our properties. These include not just Valencia oranges, but many lemon and grapefruit trees as well.

So how can you participate? It's as easy as 1-2-3:

1. On or before April 6, pick the citrus fruit from trees in your yard
2. Wash the fruit and put in plastic bags
3. Drop it off as designated collection site. Designated sites this year include fire station 18 next to Knollwood Country Club and the new fire station just South of Devonshire on Balboa. As an alternative, you can drop the fruit at my home, 17515 Horace Street (just West of Encino) as we will be making a run at the end of the day.

Specific Plan Design Review Board

The Granada Hills Specific Plan Design Review Board met on Tuesday 3/11/08 to review proposals for a new sign, recycling bin/center, and Kohl's Department store. All six Board members were present, along with representatives from Kohl's, Regency Centers, City Planning and Granada Hills residents. There were approximately 25 in attendance at the Town Hall meeting site. The 6 members of the Design Review Board (DRB) voted on the following projects:

1. Taylor signs "Tux" business wall sign, 16913 W Devonshire St. DRB Decision: Approve

2. PM Recycling Center 10365 Balboa Street
 Concerns: Poor location next to proposed new high school, target for crime and graffiti, loss of parking for nearby businesses, current blighted conditions may worsen. DRB Decision: Deny

3. Demolition of Market & Retail Shops, Construction of Kohl's Department Store
 Discussion: New traffic light signal at south end of shopping center facing Chatsworth Street and proper alignment of both north/south shopping center driveways for safety reasons; Replace speed bumps along rear alley (north); Effective light shields to protect nearby residents; Noise from truck deliveries and very early AM trash pick-up; Limit Kohl's special events/holiday sales events to a maximum of 5/year.

Concerns: Inadequate buffer (north of property), suggested 8' high wall, along with more appropriate trees that will provide a fuller screen; Possible alternative to palm trees; Need for more shade trees; Reconsider size of trees; Inconsistent with Spanish Colonial design theme; Does not integrate with the existing small-scale, local-service character of the commercial core.
 DRB Decision: Deny

The Design Review Board meets on the second and fourth Tuesday of every month. All meetings are open to the public and the public has the opportunity to address the DRB at the end of the meeting on items of interest to the public that are within the subject matter jurisdiction of the DRB. Meetings are held at the Town Hall, 16916 San Fernando Mission Blvd, Granada Hills @ 6:30 PM, but subject to change.
