### OGHRG President's Message

I almost always start my article by thanking or recognizing folks who have contributed to the organization. This month is no exception. First, a big thanks to those of you who helped with the Yard Sale on September 29. We had a large crew to help price items on Friday evening, and plenty of help to sell items on Saturday. What we did not sell was donated to the Salvation Army, with the exception of a few large things that we still hope to sell. Special thanks to VP Chris Silvers and his wife Karessa, who hosted the event.

And as long as I am thanking members, another big thank you to those who staffed the OGHRC booth at the Granada Hills Street Faire on October 6. The street faire was a lot of fun, with the largest crowd ever. We completely sold out of "History of Granada Hills" books. The author, Jim Hier was at our booth most of the day, autographing books. We also raised some money through the sales of Granada Hills "gear".

These two events have enhanced our treasury to some extent, but I am still concerned about the financial stability of our organization. We have several sources of income including:

- Voluntary membership dues (\$10 per person or \$20 per household per annum)
- Sponsors of our newsletter
- Fund raisers such as those mentioned above
- Public and private grants, donations and gifts

Our primary expenses are the monthly newsletter and liability insurance. Secondary expenses include website maintenance, office supplies, and our annual yard party. The problem is that our expenses exceed our income. The board has discussed this problem, and we believe we can balance income with expenses if more Residents submit voluntary dues and if we can add a few new monthly sponsors.

I will return to this issue next month, with additional details, and a request for your dues. We currently mail out almost 1200 monthly newsletters to local residents and businesses in Old Granada Hills. ## November Guest Speaker - C.G. (Neil) McAuliffe

C.G. (Neil) McAuliffe was born and raised in East Hartford, Connecticut where he spent an uneventful existence until entering the School of Business Administration at Boston College, from which he received a BS in Business Administration. Following graduation he enlisted in the Army for the purpose of attending Officer's Candidate School. He was commissioned a 2nd Lt. in the Artillery. His first assignment was in Korea as an Artillery Forward Observer supporting U.N. Troops. He received the Purple Heart.

Following completion of his term of service in the Army, he joined Aetna Life and Casualty as a Marketing Representative where he progressed through a series of postings to Hartford, Detroit, Poughkeepsie, Syracuse, Albany and Philadelphia ultimately being named General Manager of the Los Angeles Office.

After 25 years of service with Aetna, he served in an executive capacity with The Banksure Corporation, and as Director of ISU, the independent insurance agency franchise organization. Next he established McAuliffe Management Corporation, where he as President he offered Risk Management Services to large accounts, primarily Banks and Hospitals.

As a result of the Northridge Earthquake, a critical need arose for an organization that could render assistance to Not-for-Profit Hospitals in their dealings with FEMA. McAuliffe Management had all of the technical expertise and experience required, which was similar to insurance claim work, to act for Hospitals.

McAuliffe Management was successful in the acquisition of substantial FEMA funding for two local Hospitals.

Currently, C.G. McAuliffe serves as Chief Executive Officer of McAuliffe Financial Services, Inc. founded in 1972 by Neil G. McAuliffe - son of C.G.

## The Turkey

Some believe that the first Thanksgiving dinner was served by the Pilgrims in 1621. President Lincoln proclaimed Thanksgiving a national holiday back in 1863, that was supposedly a response to an organized campaign by a magazine editor, Sara Hale. It was President Franklin Roosevelt that moved the holiday it to the 4th Thursday in November.

Ben Franklin proposed that the turkey be the official national state bird. He was disappointed when the bald eagle was chosen saying the bald eagle has a "bad moral character" and "the turkey is a much more respectable bird"

The National Turkey Federation survey found that almost 96% of Americans eat turkey at Thanksgiving time. The average weight of the purchased turkey was 15 pounds which translates to 690 million pounds consumed at Thanksgiving in 2005. Per capita annual consumption in the US has increased from 8.3 pounds in 1975 to 16.7 pounds in 2005.

It is estimated that 256 million turkeys were raised last year with Thanksgiving accounting for 46 million, Christmas at 22 million and Easter at 119 million.

Turkey is low in fat and high in protein. It has about 70% white meat and 30% of the higher calorie and fat dark meat. More preferred in other countries, the dark meat holds up well in grilling, barbecuing and in marinades.

Many people find that they feel sleepy after a holiday turkey meal and blame it on the bird. Studies have shown that meals rich in carbohydrates may be causing the drowsiness by increasing the number of tryptophan in the brain. The protein rich turkey is probably not the cause. So take a nap anyway - after you help with the dishes. **Happy Thanksgiving !**



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Tamara's Column - Mike Tovey

Ever seen a man riding an old fashioned, big wheel bicycle around Granada Hills? Mike Tovey, 66, has been a bicycle enthusiast since he was a kid. "When I was in elementary school I saw a picture of the old fashioned big wheel, so I always wanted to ride one," Mike says.

When he started riding bicycles in high school, Mike saw his Dad at a store a few miles away from their home. "He said he would race me home...and I beat him," Mike says. "He was driving a car, so that's why I rode bikes so much, because I think they are more efficient and fast too," he says.

He now has a collection of 32 bikes in his garage. This includes a unicycle, recumbent, a tandem bike for him and his wife, road bikes, mountain bikes, four wheel bikes, and a surf bike that goes on water and pedals like a bicycle.



Friends, family members and colleagues of Mike also caught on to his passion for cycling and he now has over 100 miniature, collectible bikes from around the world. "People just started giving me [miniature] bikes to add to my collection," says Mike, who enjoys collecting bicycle memorabilia as a hobby.

Mike rides a bike to Nobel Middle School everyday, where he has been a physical education teacher for over 40 years. He has calculated that he has

biked around the world twice, just from riding to work and back. He also goes on a 50-mile ride every Saturday with a group of friends or whenever else he finds the time.

In 1994, Mike and his family rode 3,121 miles across the United States, starting at the Santa Monica pier and ending at the Statue of Liberty. "It took one month," he says.

Other places Mike has ridden include: San Francisco to Los Angeles, Los Angeles to Salt Lake City, Moab and Brian Head, Utah, the Potomac River in Washington D.C., Yellowstone, Yosemite and much more.

At Christmas, Mike dresses up as Santa Clause and takes his grandchildren (who are dressed up as elves or reindeer) on a four wheel bike to visit families around the neighborhood. "We ask them if they want a ride on Santa's sleigh and when they see it's a bicycle, we tell them it's a California sleigh," he says.

When asked if he has considered riding in the Tour De France, Mike says he always wanted to race professionally but enjoys riding as a hobby and a way to relax.

Besides bike riding, Mike enjoys backpacking, traveling, photography and working on his craftsman-style home, located on White Oak Avenue. Mike and his wife, Jill, 60, who is also a school teacher, have lived in Granada Hills for more than 30 years. They have two children and seven grandchildren.

Want to catch a glimpse of Mike riding his big wheel bicycle? "I ride the big wheel to school once a week and I ride it to church every Sunday," he says.

Devonshire District Meeting

LAPD Devonshire Division held its semi-annual district meeting October 10th at Shepherd of the Hills Church. This informative meeting, organized by Erica DeSmith, hosted by Captains Sean Kane and Beatrice Girmala covered several important topics of interest to us all.

Detective Tim Brausam showed a video taped interview with an incarcerated home burglar. This inmate talked about his career breaking into homes stealing all types of items to support his drug habit. He claimed he has burglarized thousands of homes, many more than once and up to 30 at a time. He mostly hit homes that were dark, had no dogs and looked like they might have something of value. Garages were a frequent starting point so that he could get tools to break a window or pry open a door. Once inside a home, he would take anything that he knew he could sell, even for a few dollars or less.



Distraction burglaries were also covered by showing a video that began with an elderly woman opening the front door to a younger woman. Eventually they both go to the back yard and an accomplice enters the front door and steals whatever he wants while the homeowner is distracted in conversation. Once the younger woman gets the "all done" via cell phone she leaves abruptly. It isn't until later the older woman finds her items missing.

Traffic services officer, Mark Cronin, showed some alarming videos of actual tragic collisions that could have been avoided. He stressed the importance of searing seat belts and being aware and alert while driving. Officer Cronin gave statistics mentioning that a majority of traffic accidents are caused by speeding and driving while distracted. Some of you might have seen or have personally met motor officer Cronin as he works our area, often on Rinaldi.

Detective Cynthia Dragun gave a presentation on vehicle theft and how to prevent it. As mentioned many times in this newsletter, she said not to leave virtually anything in plain sight within your car. Thieves will and have done hundreds of dollars damage to cars as they break in to steal even CDs. She completed her talk with a little surprise. During the evening she went out to the parking lot and photographed cars that had items left in plain view. When she put the pictures on the big screen no one stood up to claim ownership.

All the Senior Lead Officers were introduced and were available for questions. Anyone wanting additional information about the presentations as well as safety tips and other programs could pick up handouts in the foyer. These district meetings and the

Veterans Day - November 11th

Veterans Day originated as "Armistice Day" on November 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the end of World War I. Congress passed a resolution in 1926 for an annual observance, and Nov. 11 became a national holiday beginning in 1938. President Eisenhower signed legislation in 1954 to change the name to Veterans Day as a way to honor those who served in all American wars. The day has evolved into also honoring living

military veterans with parades and speeches across the nation. A national ceremony takes place at the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia.

**Gender:** Here are some facts and figures about the 23.7 million veterans in the United States in 2006. Of that number 1.7 million are women making up 16% of the Gulf War veterans.

**Age:** There are 9.2 million veterans aged 65 and older and at the end of the age bracket, there are 1.9 million veterans younger than 35. As of October 2, 2007, there are 3 documented World War I veterans.

**When Served:** Vietnam era veterans account for 8 million of the total number of veterans. 33% of all living veterans served during 1964-1975. In addition, 4.6 million served during the Gulf War (1990 to present); 3.2 million in World War II; 3.1 million in the Korean war; and 6.1 million in peacetime.

**Multiple Wars:** There are 430,000 living veterans who served in both the Vietnam era and the Gulf War. 350,000 who served in both Korean and Vietnam wars. 78,000 veterans who experienced World War II, the Korean War and Vietnam War. There are 294,000 living veterans that served in World War II and the Korean War.

**Disabilities:** A total of 6.1 million veterans have a disability with half of them 65 or older.

**Benefits:** 2.7 million is the number of veterans that received compensation for service related disabilities for a total of \$26.6 billion. In 2006, the Federal government spent \$72.4 billion for veterans programs. Of this total, \$35.4 billion went to compensation and pensions and \$31.3 billion for medical programs. *Most data for the year 2006; source: U.S. Census Bureau*



Hospital High Meeting - October 18th

There was a meeting with Tamar Galatzan, the new LAUSD Board member representing our district, and several members from Old Granada Hills. Tamar brought in Al Grazioli, from LAUSD Facilities, who is in charge of new schools in the Valley.

The current status of the school is that the State Department of Architecture has approved the plans and will go out to bid within a couple of weeks. That would mean construction starting early in the second 2nd quarter of 2008 with completion in 2011.

We first raised the issue of the actual need of the school which was inadequately answered by, "the demographics support the need". Whereas Monroe High has seen some overcrowding relief due to other schools that have opened, projected student population growth still requires this school to be built. We were told that even with the elimination of busing and the other area schools scheduled to be built, the area would be short of adequate classrooms. Tamar said she had seen the data and heard recent reports and is basically in agreement with the need of a new school, however, she did agree that we needed to see some more demographic statistics which will be forthcoming. That data will supposedly convince us that LAUSD needs this school. It will also be used to establish the actual boundaries to be set about 1 year before the school is complete and ready to open.

Dave Beauvais brought up the issue of the vacant former Medical building next to the parking structure that the district owns but is not part of the school. The concern is what is going to happen to that building because it could have a significant impact on the parking situation. As currently planned, the parking structure is going to be used solely for the school staff and students. (LAUSD does have a policy of allowing high schools to be built without any student parking on site) A problem could arise if LAUSD decides to use that building for a use that would necessitate taking away a portion of the parking in the structure. Tamar wants to protect the parking structure use exclusively for the school and discussion began on ways that could happen. It might not require any special LAUSD Board action if the EIR has correctly qualified its use.

Traffic and student safety was another big topic discussed. Concerns about student drop off and how northbound Balboa

drivers would access the school. Mitigation ideas included; forced direction medians, restriping, curb red zones, using the alley off Devonshire, and enforcement. Sidewalks in designated student walking routes will be repaired or built and paid for in a 50/50 program with the city and LAUSD.

So, the school is moving forward as planned. The direct answer to the question "why", is that it is needed, the plans have been approved and LAUSD has \$30 million invested in this site. (There is a regulation or law that would require LAUSD to first offer the property to all government/municipalities if they decided to cancel the project and sell the property) Tamar Galatzan has promised to be available and have additional meetings with the community. We will keep you updated.

*Editorial Opinion: How are we supposed to be appeased with the school moving forward now that "they" said the demographics prove the need? Through this entire process, we were promised their demographic data and it either never materialized, was inadequate or in some instances incorrect. And are we to be comforted to know that LAUSD will work with the city traffic department to mitigate potential problems? Is this the same department that left out some traffic flow on Devonshire in their report and did not take into consideration what impact the school will have on new regional Fire Station when Balboa and Devonshire becomes a class F intersection. Is this the same department that helped with the "Kohl's" traffic report.*

*This high school seems to have been a "done deal" almost 4 years ago when the bankruptcy judge - for some reason - reversed his decision after a meeting in chambers, and awarded the purchase of the Hospital site to LAUSD. The huge LAUSD machine moves in their own direction at their own pace pausing along the way to smirk at the community.*

Singer's Zingers - Now You See And Now You Don't

There are numerous occupations and professions that from time to time use some form of the "slide of hand" technique long credited to the magic practitioners and illusionists. Joining the group in the past half century, however, are the advertising fraternity, organized labor and the assemblage of "self-proclaimed" public servants. The latter have become experts in the art of "now you see it and now you don't" when it comes to our tax money disappearing right before our very eyes. The latest fiasco was brought to light recently by the Daily News showing that the average carpenter working for the DWP earns \$76,949 annually, while in the private sector only make \$47,680. Civil engineers working for the DWP make \$122,560 while the equivalent job in the private sector makes \$80,020. Some classification comparisons reflect even larger discrepancies. This is the same DWP who is trying to get a 9% electric rate increase and a six percent water rate hike. This is the same DWP that operates as a department of the City of Los Angeles, thereby avoiding jurisdiction of the California Utilities Commission.

It's time for our overpaid city council to earn their money and put a stop to this milking of the taxpayers. What has our illustrious mayor done for us on this labor boon doggle --- GUESS !

Las Lomas Project

At our October monthly meeting, Dave Beauvais, read a letter from Greig Smith asking for the Group's support in opposing the proposed Las Lomas Project. The vote was unanimous in opposing the project.

For those not familiar with the project, it is located in the Newhall Pass on a triangle of land at the convergence of the 5 and 14 freeways. With a total of 555 acres, setting aside 285 acres of open space, the developer proposes to build:

- 5,800 to 9,670 residential living units
- 2.3 million sq ft of office space
- 225,000 sq ft of retail
- 250,000 sq ft of Community Facilities; High School, police station, fire station and post office
- 300 room hotel
- Wastewater treatment facility

Just taking the residential numbers, this project is way too large for the area. Current county zoning only allows for a total of 247 homes. 15,000 residents would be housed at an average of 42 per acre. Compare that with the current San Fernando Valley's 10 people per acre.

With that number of people and their vehicles, estimates have run as high as 70,000 additional traffic trips in the area that would impact 32 major intersections in the valley.

We have not heard from anyone that is in favor of this project and wonder why it remains even remotely viable. However, if you would like to see a presentation from the developer and form your own personal opinion, they will be at the Porter Ranch Neighborhood Council meeting on November 13th at Shepherd of the Hills Church, 7:00 PM. 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**Interim Control Ordinance**

There are several communities within the City of Los Angeles that have enacted Interim Control Ordinances (ICO) in hopes of limiting out of control development. Old Granada Hills (OGH) also has such an ordinance that applies to residential development only. In the past, our older community was subjected to an ever increasing trend of lot subdivision. Then, the single home on that large lot was demolished and replaced by multiple, oversized mega-structures. As we have witnessed, this type of overdevelopment has destabilized and destroyed many once beautiful and thriving San Fernando Valley neighborhoods.

There are two pending regulations, when enacted will limit overbuilding:

1. Councilman Greig Smith's proposed motion (adopted by City Council August 13, 2003) to change the zone designation in OGH from R1 to RE11.
2. The proposed Citywide Baseline Mansionization Ordinance that limits the Building footprint.

Since it may take some time to enact the above legislation, our community would once again be subjected to incompatible development without the continuance of an ICO. Therefore, Councilman Greig Smith initiated Ordinance No. 179185, a subsequent Old Granada Hills- Interim Control Ordinance that imposes interim regulations on the issuance of certain building permits and on the approval for subdivisions for all residentially zoned lots. The following stipulations are included in the OGH-ICO (approved, as of September 14, 2007):

1. Prohibits the creation of lots less than 9,000 sq ft
2. Height limit of 28'
3. Total floor area of one-family dwelling, excluding garage:
  - a. 1,800 sq ft for lots that are 5,000 sq ft in area
  - b. 2,400 sq ft for lots that are 7,500 sq ft in area
  - c. 2,700 sq ft for lots that are 9,000 sq ft in area

The alteration or addition to a one-family dwelling does not exceed 40% of the original size of the dwelling, excluding the garage.

If you haven't noticed, OGH is undergoing a very positive revival. Many homeowners feel that this community is worth the investment. There have been some gorgeous remodels that certainly enhance the beauty of this community. But to remind you this just does not happen, it takes a concerted effort to make this happen. Thankfully, we have incredible neighborhood support and outstanding participation. And hopefully we will be able to preserve this quaint community with all of its unique characteristics – most notably, single family homes on larger lots! *Maria Fisk*

**Kohl's**

In case you missed the recent article in the Daily news, ("Are you Being Well Served?" by Julie Scott, 10/12/07), Kohl's Corporation did not exactly get raving reviews. In fact, JD Power and Associates ranked Macy's and Kohl's last when it comes to customer service, "they could boost their ratings if their sales-people were more courteous, friendly, and speedy...." Over the past several months, there have been other reports regarding Kohl's lackluster performance. Additionally, a few OGH residents have been emailing each other, questioning the financial status and stability of this discount retailer. So, maybe it would be good time to shed some light on some of these events and take a closer look at the company's stock.

Kohl's Corporation (symbol KSS) made 52 week high on 4//20/07 trading @ \$79.55 per share and slid to a 52 week low on 9/11/07 trading at \$52.50 per share. As of 10/17/07 KSS was trading @ \$57.57 per share.

In comparison Target Corporation (symbol TGT) reached a 52 week high on 7/13/07 trading @ \$70.75. Shares of Target stock are also trading lower, but did not slide to a year low in recent months, as did Kohl's stock. As of 10/17/07 TGT was trading @ \$63.42 per share.

Generally, the retail sector has experienced dismal performance despite a booming stock market. Some retailers have also suffered recent year lows as did Kohl's Corporation. Some analysts blame the weather and others blame the housing slump. One thing for certain, there is much more competition amongst retailers and the competition is fierce, forcing some to close or restructure (i.e. Bullocks, Robinsons-May, Sears, Kmart) So what is the future for Kohl's ?? Even though Kohl's is not the only retailer having problems, it is being hit harder than most, according to some analysts. It is difficult to predict if this is a temporary trend or a more permanent one. But we certainly cannot afford to have a retailer move in that is on shaky financial ground. What happens if the Granada Village Shopping Center is allowed to expand for the sole purpose of accommodating a giant sized Kohl's. And what if Kohl's runs into long-term financial difficulties and closes the Granada Hills store. THEN WHAT? What else could move into a 95,000 sq ft building?? You got it - another Big Box!
